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Idaho State Legislature 2009 Legislative Session

April is here...and so are the legislators

When the 2009 Legislative Session began, lawmakers were predicting a short session and an early end-date near the end of March. With the introduction of stimulus funds, the date was pushed out--and out. And now, with the Governor and the Legislature at odds over transportation funding, this could end up as one of the longest sessions on record (the longest session was in 2003, when the legislature adjourned after 118 days; today is the 83rd legislative day of the 2009 Legislative Session).

Day Care Licensing bill update: House will vote this week

[Senate Bill 1112aa - Basic Day Care License](#) stalled in the House Health & Welfare Committee on Thursday, March 26th. Members of the committee voted to hold the bill in committee, but many expressed interest in amending the bill and giving it a second look. The bill's second chance hearing occurred on Thursday, April 2nd. After several amendments, the bill cleared the House Health & Welfare Committee by a unanimous vote.

Next steps: SB1112aa has been sent to the House General Order for amendment. After that the bill will be placed on the House reading calendar, and will likely be up for debate sometime this week.

If this bill passes, it will be the first time in 20 years day care licensing has made it through the Idaho Legislature. It will require:

- criminal background checks for providers and other adults who have direct unsupervised contact with children;
- compliance with basic health and safety standards;
- restrictions on firearms, alcohol, and tobacco use during the hours of day care operation.

Also, after incorporating the amendments made by the House Health & Welfare Committee, the bill will require licensing for providers who care for 7 or more unrelated children.

HB 245: opening the door for Parents as Teachers funding

Parents as Teachers was a successful home visitation program until state funding for the program was cut in 2007. [House Bill 245, "Parents as Teachers Family Support Act,"](#) won't bring the program back immediately, but if passed it could facilitate a return of the program to Idaho in the future. This bill establishes the Idaho Children's Trust Fund as the administrative entity for Parents as Teachers in Idaho. There is no funding in this bill, but it sets up a place for funds in case federal funds become available from the federal "Education Begins At Home Act" or other similar funding sources.

HB 245 is on the Senate 3rd Reading Calendar, and should be debated by the full Senate later this week. Nearly everyone in the early childhood development and education community believes that Parents as Teachers is a worthwhile program and HB245 appears to be on track for passage.

Emerging Issues

IVC is researching possible initiatives to strengthen sentencing in child abuse cases. We will report back to you after the session on our findings and the IVC Policy Workgroup on Emerging Issues will make recommendations to the IVC Board on a possible course of action for the 2010 Legislative Session.

The legislation also gives the Idaho Children's Trust Fund the authority to pursue grants and other sources of funding to support this program. H0252 Multiple sponsors*	School Districts - Financial Emergencies - Amends and adds to existing law relating to school district financial emergencies to provide for notice requirements in the event a financial emergency has been declared; to provide an exception to the issuance of certain contracts; to clarify language; to provide for an informal review under certain circumstances; to provide for a due process hearing and procedure under certain circumstances; to provide that a due process hearing is not required under certain circumstances; to provide for financial emergencies; and to provide a time requirement for preparation of a budget if a financial emergency has been declared. H0256 Multiple sponsors*	Public Schools - This legislation eliminates reimbursement for miles that are unrelated to transporting students to and from school, including the elimination of state funding for field trips. Provisions related to reducing costs include the institution of a one-year freeze in movement on the state salary reimbursement grid for years of experience. This bill also phases out of the Early Retirement Program for teachers. The legislation also encourages districts to accommodate reductions in state funding for salaries by either reducing the level of pay, or reducing the number of paid contract days, and requires that any reduction in contract days not result in a reduction of student-teacher contact time. S1089 Multiple sponsors*	Motor vehicle passenger safety, children - The purpose of this legislation is to remove two exemptions in Idaho's Child Safety Seat Statute. The first exemption does not require restraints for children if all restraints are utilized. This language assures protection for adults but leaves children unprotected. The second exemption allows a child to be removed from his or her safety restraint for virtually any reason so long as it is to accommodate the child's "psychological needs." This term is undefined and extremely broad. This loophole makes enforcement nearly impossible for law enforcement, prosecution and judges. <p>S1112aa Sponsors: Sen. Corder, Rep. Saylor</p>	<p>Basic Day Care License - This legislation amends Idaho Code to revise and extend the State's licensing requirements for child care providers. The current code provides minimum health and safety standards for day care centers with thirteen or more children, but does not provide licensure for providers with fewer than thirteen. This legislation would extend licensing to all providers who receive compensation and care for four or more children, with specific exceptions maintained. Basic requirements include: criminal history background checks, health, safety and fire inspections and restrictions on firearms, alcohol and tobacco use. Minimum standards for infant CPR and first aid training are specified. This act establishes staff-child ratio recommendations consistent with nationally accepted standards and provides for fees to be established based upon the number of children. The Health and Welfare Department will serve as the portal or administrator for the program. Schroeder</p>	<p>Sex offenders, minimum sentencing - The purpose of this legislation is to provide mandatory minimum penalties for persons who commit any lewd or lascivious act or acts upon or with the body or any part or member thereof of a minor child less than 12 years of age.</p>	<p>Senate Judiciary & Rules Committee</p>
<p>S1048 Sponsor: Robert Aldridge</p>	<p>Disabled persons, certain guardians prohibited - This bill makes necessary corrections to the Idaho probate code regarding guardianships and conservatorships, especially for minors. Sections One, Two, and Three of the bill provide protections to the appointment of the guardian of a minor, including that the petition must include a statement as to whether the proposed guardian, or a person who resides at or frequents the proposed place of residence of the minor, is a felon, and, in Section Three, that the guardian must take reasonable steps to protect the minor from such felons. There have been an increasing number of cases involving minors where felons are involved, which can cause danger to the minor, including sexual or other abuse.</p>	<p>Senate PASSED 33-0-2; House Judiciary, Rules & Administration Committee</p>

<p>H0108 Sponsor: Rep. Rusche</p>	<p>Insurance contracts, coverage - The purpose of this revision is to allow individuals who are unmarried, are under the age of 25 years, and are financially dependent to remain under their parents' health insurance coverage. This revision will allow health insurance coverage for those who are part-time students or laid off from work and cannot afford health insurance on their own.</p>	<p>House PASSED 66-2-2 Senate PASSED 35-0-0 Speaker of the House signed President of the Senate signed</p>
<p>S1107 Sponsors: Sen. Bair, Rep. Rusche</p>	<p>Insurance contracts, coverage - Certain children suffer from severe, life-threatening food allergies. For children with this very rare condition, elemental (aminoacid based) formulas allow these children to absorb nutrition, heal and grow without requiring prolonged intravenous feeding. These severe food allergies usually are not present at birth and, when treated correctly, usually resolve over time. Some health plans refuse to cover the lifesaving nutritional formula which may cost more than many families can afford (up to \$2400/month). This bill requires that health plans not exclude coverage for these children, and cover the cost of this lifesaving treatment as they do for other conditions (congenital and metabolic conditions).
