Idahoans live with some form of mental illness


The opioid epidemic

have consistently outpaced national trends and ranked among the highest of all states for the last ten years.




leading cause of death ages 15-34 and for men up to 44

Barriers to Access

Despite the need for treatment for behavioral health issues, more than half of Idahoans did not receive needed services from 2011-2015. Lack of access to behavioral health services and social stigma create roadblocks to recovery, especially in rural Idaho.



Mental illness and substance use disorders are treatable.

People can live fulfilling and productive lives when they receive adequate treatment for any illness, and behavioral health is no exception. Like physical health, prevention is key. Resources are used more efficiently when behavioral health care is integrated into Idaho's broader health system. This leads to better outcomes for patients, providers and payers. When people have affordable, comprehensive coverage, treatment and recovery are possible.

Retention of behavioral health providers through satisfactory reimbursement



Fully-funded substance use disorder treatment to prevent recidivism in Idaho's criminal justice system



Equal access for in-network behavioral health services
